Here it is August already...and the summer is more than halfway over. I hope that you are enjoying some rest and relaxation!

I can't seem to pick up anything to read, whether it's a newspaper, some type of news feed on my computer, or a periodical, without finding articles about retirement. With so many baby boomers getting to that age I guess I should expect it. Articles tell me how to boost my retirement, how to save for retirement, how to use certain plans to have a successful retirement. Some of these articles talk about maximizing the money that I've saved, some talk about maximizing my government benefits, some talk about how I can lower my taxes in retirement. Some articles talk about retirement without even retiring, they say keep on working or take on a new job in the gig economy. Frankly, that doesn't seem like much of a retirement to me.

When I retire I want to do some of those things I've put off over my working years: spend more time with family, travel, get immersed in my hobbies...those kinds of things. I've begun a bucket list to keep track of all the things I'd like to do when I retire.

Here are a few of my thoughts about retirement:

1. I want to retire "to" something, not "from" something. Many believe that the rocking chair on the front porch kills retirees. Retirement means having something different to engage in, not simply sitting around and doing nothing.
2. "Begin with the end in sight." One of the seven habits of successful people as espoused by Stephen Covey. What do you want your retirement to look like? What do you want to do, where do you want to go, how do you want to continue to contribute

3. Have goals and have a plan. If you begin with the end in sight, now you have to make a plan on how you want to get there. Write it down, make it happen, the book by Henriette Klauser might be helpful. A goal without a plan to get there is just a dream.

I've talked to a number of members and their spouses lately and retirement always comes up as a topic of conversation when we review their current situation. It doesn't seem to matter their age. I've had members as young as 35 and as old as 70 over the past couple of months want to talk about retirement and making sure that they're set at some point in the future. Let's face it, the 35 year old has a lot more time to plan. Time is an ally for him. As changes occur in the economy, he has time to make course corrections. He has time to contribute more to meet the family's income goals, he'll probably earn more as he progresses in his career. For the older member, time is no friend. Deacon's Teaching

Is Jesus Sacrificed Again at Every Mass?

The dazzling vision of St. John in the Book of Revelation is perhaps best known for its depictions of horrific worldwide catastrophe. Yet at the heart to this text stands a poignant figure full of mercy, hope, and glory, the "Lamb" who was slain for our sins, Jesus Christ^(5:6). Biblical scholars have pointed out that at one level, in presenting us a vision of heaven, Revelation also provides us a glimpse of the Mass, our foretaste on earth of heaven's "wedding feast of the Lamb"^(19:9).

Catholics agree with other Christians that the divine sacrifice made "once for all" described in Hebrews 7:27 is a unique historical event, the death of Jesus Christ on the cross. But Jesus' sacrifice, though occurring in the past to us, is nevertheless always present to God because God himself does not exist in time as we do. He lives in the eternal present; with God there is no past and no future.

St. John's vision depicts this eternal reality; the presentation of Jesus as "Lamb" to the Father appears to be an ongoing occurrence (from God's perspective, timeless), long after the death of Jesus^(Rv 5:6; 13:8). Our Savior, Scriptures says, "has a priesthood that does not pass away"^(Heb. 7:24).

In this light, then, we can understand how the Mass is a re-presentation of Jesus' historical, one-time sacrificial death on the cross. In every Mass, the priest re-enacts Jesus' priestly actions at the Last Supper, offering once more his Body and Blood. But Jesus is not sacrificed again in the Eucharist. Rather, his unique sacrifice is made real and present to us

here and now because it is a divine reality that transcends space and time.

For this reason, the Mass is not merely a service of praise, preaching, and fellowship, presided over by a pastor around a meal table. The Mass is truly a re-presenting of the original sacrifice offered by a priest upon an altar.

Though some Christians insist that priests and altars belong only to the Jewish temple sacrifice of the Old Covenant, these elements also play a role in the New covenant in Christ's blood^(Lk 22:14-20). The Book of Revelation in particular tells us of the "altar" with a "gold censer" in the "temple" where the sacrificed Lamb, Jesus, reigns^(5:6, 6:9; 8:3; 9:13).

Did You Know?

The College of Cardinals

After the Pope, the "College of Cardinals" is the highest-ranking office in the Roman Catholic Church; each Cardinal is chosen by the Pope. This body plays two roles for the Church:

1. Participating in papal elections when the Holy See is vacant, and
2. Advising the Pope about Church matters when he summons them to a consistory.

There are three ranks of Cardinals: Cardinal Bishops, Cardinal Priests, and Cardinal Deacons. Almost all Cardinals are also bishops.

Catholic Demographic Trends

- Infant Baptisms down 41.5% since 2000
- One in five Baptized do not get first Communion
- Two in five Baptized do not get Confirmed
- Catholic marriages down 55% since 1990
- 85% of Confirmed stop practicing by age 21
 - Their decisions are made by age 13
- Only 10% of practicing Catholics attend weekly mass
 - 31% drop in weekly mass attendance since 2000
- Will lose half of donors in five – ten years
- Post pandemic return to pews is done
